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152 Georgetown units enter design review

Georgetown Community Development Authority is planning three workforce housing projects in that neighborhood. In the middle of the trio, all on separate blocks touching Fourth Avenue South, is a roughly half-acre property at 402. S Lucile St. There, with TWG Development, the plan is for an eight-story, 152-unit building currently dubbed Elements at Georgetown.

Jackson Main Architecture is now designing the project, which will have its first design review on May 24, in a virtual presentation.

The project will be the first of three workforce housing buildings planned in the same area.

Eleven structured parking stalls are planned; a bike room is also likely. Two commercial bays would have

about 1,800 square feet. Total project size is estimated at 115,250 square feet.

Rents will be affordable to those earning a range from 30% to 60% of area median income. Sizes will run from studios to three-bedrooms. Eight of the apartments would be live/work units at grade, facing the south-facing courtyard of the C-shaped building.

The project budget hasn't been announced, though the Washington State Housing Finance Commission is now weighing a \$28 million bond issue to support it.

The team also includes KLLA Landscape Architects.

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
